Professor Samuel FAMIYEH

1969 – 2023

'To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven, A time to be born, and a time to die, A time to plant and a time to pluck what is planted'.

Ecclesiastes 3:1-2.



he Late Professor Samuel Famiyeh, whose mortal remains lies before us this day, was born on 10th March 1969. His parents were the late Mr. Benjamin Atta Famiyeh, a personnel of the security intelligence services (special branch) and native of Esiama in the Nzema East Municipality of the Western Region and Madam Sophia Brace, a trader and native of Enchi in the Western North Region of Ghana respectively. Being a Monday male born, he was affectionately called Joojo or simply Joo.

Samuel lived his formative years at Enchi with his mother, siblings and other family members, while his father was often away due to the nature of his work. In 1975, at the age of six, he began his education at the Enchi L/A primary school. At age of twelve, he was admitted to the then Enchi Junior Secondary School (JUSSEC), one of the then model junior secondary schools in the country. Joo was bright at school and usually top of his class.

While waiting for his junior secondary school results, the tall and lanky Joojo had a strong desire to enter a mainstream

secondary school. His desire to join a secondary school was so strong that he persuaded his parents to enroll him at Asankragua Senior Secondary School while awaiting the results of the junior secondary school examinations. When the examination results were released, the young Samuel passed successfully. and gain admission to the Ghana Secondary Technical School (GSTS) at Takoradi. In 1983, he entered GSTS, Takoradi for his secondary school education and completed in 1986 with a G.C.E Ordinary level certificate.

Samuel spent his school holidays assisting with the family business at the timber market in Accra, ostensibly to ensure that he had his fees and provisions for the upcoming term, so that he could focus at school. Once upon a time, his fees and pocket money overly delayed because the one assigned to deliver it, had other ideas much to the dismay of Samuel. Hence, his decision to move to Accra to secure it himself, as we say in our Ghanaian parlance, safety first. Such was his determination and passion to chase his dream into academia.

In 1987, his hunger and thirst for education spurred him on to Tarkwa secondary school (TARSCO) for his sixth form education where he obtained the G.C.E Advanced Level certificate, in 1989. Samuel found himself back at Enchi, as a national service personnel impacting knowledge at the basic school. Having set his goals to pursue higher education, he gained admission to the then University of Science and Technology (UST) now Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST), Kumasi. He graduated successfully, and was awarded a Bachelor of Science degree, (Geological engineering) by the UST in February 1997.

After Samuel had attained this humble feat, he gained employment with the Billiton Bogoso Gold, as a mining engineer in 1998, and later joined Goldfields Ghana limited, Tarkwa from 1999-2000.

At the turn of the new millennia, in October 2000, Samuel travelled to Germany for further studies at the Technische Universität Bergakademie Freiberg, Faculty of Business Administration and Economics, where he obtained an MBA in International Management of Resources and Environment, in 2002. He came back to Ghana briefly for research work and returned to Germany to pursue a Doctorate Degree at the same University in Freiberg. His doctoral work was "An investigation into the extent of environmental commitment in the Ghanaian economy and strategic policy recommendations". He received a doctorate degree in 2005, to the admiration of family, friends and all, who knew Dr Samuel Famiyeh from his humble beginnings.

On his return from further studies abroad, in 2005, Dr. Samuel Famiyeh, founded Integrated and Resources Management Services to offer his vast knowledge in mining and environmental management to industry players. He became a beacon of hope and a source of inspiration to his family, close associates, and all he came into contact with.

In 2006, Dr Samuel Famiyeh took up a full time appointment with the Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration (GIMPA) in Accra, as a Lecturer at the Business School, where he contributed immensely in shaping and developing critical minds for business, politics, governance and other spheres of human endeavor.



In 1999, while on job attachment at the Prestea Goldfields at Prestea in the Western region, Samuel met a young and attractive Miss Cynthia Famiyeh (nee Brakoh), a final year student of the then Takoradi Polytechnic now Takoradi Technical University, who was on a visit and helping her mother in her pastry business near the mining company. They struck an acquaintance and tied the knot in September 2000. The marriage union was blessed with four (4) children, namely Wendy, Samuel Jnr, Annabel and Nathan.

Professor Samuel Famiyeh was a committed family man and deeply involved in the nurturing and upbringing of the children despite the pressures on his time and the excessive demands of work. He was dedicated and committed to whatever endeavour he undertook. From 2020, he was engaged in weekend lecturing in the Kumasi and Takoradi campuses but nevertheless, made time to connect in worship and fellowship at the Emmanuel Methodist Church, Ashalley Botwe whenever he was able to do so.

He was a good man, whose generosity extended to all within his reach. Prof Famiyeh related well with family members, work colleagues and all who came to know him. He had a subtle smile and great sense of humor. He was of a very gentle disposition. His humility was exceptional and evident in every sphere of his life. A man of character who had deep concern and empathy for others. He sometimes went above and beyond to offer assistance to those seeking jobs, career advice, and school placements s, just to mention a few.

In 2019, Prof Samuel was appointed chairman of the governing council of Enchi College of Education. In June 2023, he

delivered his Inaugural Lecture and was inducted into the college of professors at GIMPA. It is an achievement he aspired to attain at the pinnacle of his career as a top academic. We are grateful to God for the attainment of that noble dream by Prof Famiyeh barely three months before his sudden death. Up until his demise, Prof. Famiyeh was Dean of the GIMPA Business School.

Prof. Samuel Famiyeh was returning to Accra from a training workshop in Takoradi when he was taken ill. He responded to the glorious call on Friday, 22nd September 2023, at the 37 Military Hospital, Accra. We had hope that Prof. Samuel Famiyeh would stay around a little longer to see his children flourish, for friends and family to continue enjoying his good counsel and company, and for him to enjoy the fruits of his labour. Alas! Death laid its icy hands on him unexpectedly and painfully. All we have of him now are his memories carefully woven in our thoughts.

We agree with Marie Curie, that "In the midst of life, there's death" and further share in the belief that "If we live, we live for the Lord, and when we die, we die for the Lord, so whether we live or die, we belong to the Lord" *Romans 14: 8.* Prof Famiyeh, we are consoled by this Biblical text from the Apostle Paul, that God has given you a resting place from your earthly labours. The late Professor Samuel Famiyeh, left behind his mother, wife and children, family and a host of loved ones far and near to mourn him.


into a dedicated educator, every moment was a testament to his brilliance and kindness.





In the year 2000, Samuel Famiyeh was a student at the TU Bergakademie Freiberg in the newly established MBA study programme, International Management of Resources and Environment (IMRE). Because the Institution had no experience with international study programmes, there were a lot of challenges faced by the Programme Director, the Programme Coordinator, the teachers, and the students, as there was no experience with international study programmes at the university.

Students shaped IMRE just as much as their lecturers did, and they helped to create awareness and reputation which made the programme successful in later years.

Samuel was one of them, not only working hard on his curriculum and learning a lot, but also serving as an early student leader for the benefit of his peers. His MBA graduation did not end his affiliation with TU Bergakademie Freiberg, as he returned to complete a PhD thesis, earning him the highest academic degree with a grade that opened up numerous alternatives for an academic future.

He was able to fulfill his dreams by entering GIMPA and gradually but steadily progressing through the various levels until his most recent appointment as a full Professor, having previously served as Dean of the Business School. Over the years, he became an accomplished researcher with an in- depth knowledge in statistical methods applied to the field of environmental management. This field captivated him from his initial classes in Freiberg until his final day, which came far too soon. He was a gifted teacher, student guide, academic debater and a highly productive author of numerous top-class publications in peer reviewed Journals. Above all, he was a distinguished individual, a man of understanding and tolerance who was proud of his native country. His sense of subtle humour will remain unforgettable.

His untimely death prevented him from further developing his skills at a time when they would have been in high demand, as humanity faces global challenges related to climate change, resource conservation, energy transition, decarbonization and poverty reduction.


Once he enrolled in a doctoral programme, I could do no less.

We stayed in constant touch even after I left GIMPA. He would always call to check on me and the family. It always made me feel bad for not being as diligent with phone calls as he was. I never had to wait long to receive another phone call from him.

he late Professor Samuel Famiyeh joined the Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration (GIMPA) as a Lecturer (PhD) on 13th July 2006. His journey started from the GIMPA Public Services School GPSS), now School of Public Service and Governance (SPSG). As a member of the faculty, Sam, as he was affectionately called by his colleagues was a utility player, teaching on various courses at undergraduate and graduate levels as well as senior management training programmes related to his field. Due to his background and rich experience in environmental management, he was appointed Coordinator for the Occupational Safety, Health and Environmental Management, a role he performed with great passion and commitment. He contributed significantly to the restructuring of the course. Samuel brought to bear in his teaching his expertise as an academic and an astute professional which endeared him to students. For him, it was not enough to only teach theories; it was more important to let students understand how to apply and practice them in the work environment. He maintained a good relationship with his students even after their graduation and provided them with advice and support in their professional work. Such was his passion and commitment to duty. In August 1, 2007, Familyeh was transferred to 20

the GIMPA Business School since the school had a need for lecturers in his areas of expertise (project and operations management) and also a need for more Ph.D. holders as required by the National Accreditation Board (NAB) now known as Ghana Tertiary Education Commission (GTEC). At the Business School he taught courses related to operations, supply chain and project management and environmental management and sustainability at the graduate and undergraduate levels. As one of the few PhD holders on the faculty, he played a leading role in enhancing the GIMPA Business School brand. In view of his rich experience in the mining sector, Sam was a key resource person for a customized management development training programme that the Institute designed and delivered to the senior management of AngloGold Ashanti. Not only did he teach on the programme but he also led the GIMPA team on field visits to the mines to observe how the students applied the knowledge from the classroom on the job. He brought a lot of value to the programme and inspired many of the AngloGold staff to enrol on GIMPA MBA programmes.

As a young academic Dr. Famiyeh understood the tenets of the career i.e. to either publish or perish. He therefore immersed himself in research, consistently publishing articles in high impact journals. He also took advantage of the Institute's sponsorship and attended international conferences related to his field, Productions and Operations Management Society (POMS) Annual Conference, especially, to share knowledge, learn from other academics and growth his professional network. By dint of hard work, commitment and discipline he satisfied the Institute's requirement and was promoted to the rank of Senior Lecturer, then Associate Professor and finally Professor. On 7th June 2023 at a colourful but solemn ceremony at GB Auditorium at GIMPA, the unassuming Samuel Famiyeh was inducted into the College of Professors as Professor of Operations and Supply Chain Management.

The late Prof. Famiyeh was a mentor to many young academics with whom co-authored papers and taught them the secrets of the trade. He published over 40 articles in internationally ranked journals, delivered over eighteen (18) international and local conference presentations, developed over 20 technical papers, and have mentored a number of junior faculty members in the area of research to be promoted to the rank of senior lecturers. Between the period 2018 to 2019, He won one of the merits and prestigious research awards – Literati by the Journal of Engineering, Design and Technology (JEDT), and Journal of Quality in Maintenance Engineering (JQME) both journals published by Emerald Publications, UK. Prof. Famiyah was a scholar par excellence.

In addition to being a scholar, Prof. Famiyeh also served in academic leadership position at the Business School. He was Head of Department of Management Science, Acting Dean and then Dean, a position he held till his sudden demise. As Dean he was instrumental in the introduction of the one-year master's programmes. Though soft spoken he was firm but fair, treating the faculty and staff with respect. He believed in team work and will always involve the leadership of the school in key decisions concerning the running of the school. He demonstrated innovative thinking and tenacious patience which enabled him to lead successfully. Prof. Famiyeh always made time for his colleagues, his student/participants and all he encountered in his line of work. He was a good boss to his subordinates,

The late Prof. Famiyeh imbibed the value of service and served diligently on many committees within and outside of GIMPA. For example, he was a former Chairman of the Academic Planning Committee and Appointments and Promotions Committee of the Business School for many years. He was a member of the Academic Board. The late Famiyeh's contributions to institutional building was recognized beyond GIMPA. He was an external examiner for the Department of Material Science, Logistics, Supply Chain and Information Systems and Department of Building and Construction, all of KNUST. He also served as Chairman of the Governing Council of the Enchi College of Education, Enchi, in the Western North Region of Ghana, his beloved hometown.

The late Sam was a true family man. He was a loving husband to his wife Cynthia who he always talked about, devoted father to his two lovely daughters Wendy and Annabel and two Samuel Jnr. and Nathan and a responsible son to his mother Madam Sophia.

Mrs. Cynthia Famiyeh and your children, our hearts and prayers are with you at this most difficult time. To the extended Famiyeh family, we extend our deepest condolence to you all.

Prof. Famiyeh, to say that your death took us by surprise, is be an understatement. Oh, how we wish this was but a dream. We have come to terms with the reality that you have gone to your maker. 

- * "His advice and guidance were the cornerstones to help so many grow. He will never be forgotten."


